

Before you learn the tune, sing the song a few times and then sing it in your head while you are learning it. This will help you to play the notes the correct length.


2 Row Row Row Your Boat

Look at the different ways notes are written in this tune. This tells you how long each note needs to be played for. Here you are playing crotchets, quavers and minims!






Hickory Dickory Dock






There is a symbol in this tune called a 'rest'.




Mary Had A Little Lamb



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This is another lullaby. Do you remember what 'lullaby' means?




15 The Wheels on the Bus

Which notes are repeated in this tune?






Frere Jacques

Did you know that some monks live in Portglenone? Do you know where they live? Have you ever heard any of them ringing the bell?



It looks like a tune that has a lot of notes in it to learn, but half of it is repeated. Can you see the lines that are repeated?








Báidín Fheidhlímí

This is a traditional Irish song which originates in the Gaeltacht region in the north-west of Co. Donegal. It is about a small boat owned by a man called Feilimí (Phelim). The song tells us about Feilimí sailing his little boat to Gabhla (Gola) and Toraigh (Tory). Can you mark on the map below where Co. Donegal, Gabhla (Gola) and Toraigh (Tory) are?










Trasna na dTonnta

This song means 'Over the Waves' and is about someone sailing west back to Ireland.

Most of these notes are in an octave higher than the last tunes. Practice your 'D' scale in the higher octave before learning this tune.



This song tells us about a beautiful woman called Peigín from Leitir Móir. 'Leitir Móir' is in Co. Galway.

Can you mark on the map on pg. 14 where Leitir Móir is?



The Harp That Once Through Tara's Halls

Tara, in Co. Meath, was home to Irish high kings before the time of St. Patrick.

The harp is the national symbol of Ireland.

Mo Chailín Rua

'Mo Chailín Rua' translates as 'My Red-Haired Girl'.

This is a song to the beautiful Cailín Rua who takes everything the poet has to offer and then leaves him for a 'shop boy' in the end.

The tune of this song has a mixture of crotchets (long) and quavers (short) in it



This is a love song about a man in love with a brown-haired girl, but her Daddy doesn't know.

This tune is in timing and played like a very slow jig. Most of the notes are written in groups of 3. If you count '1-2-3, 1-2-3' when you're playing these groups of 3, this will help with your timing.

There are a lot of the same notes repeated in this tune. If you underline the notes that are the same, you'll see that you have less to learn!





Can you name them?


Remember to count 1-2-3, 1-2-3 when playing this tune and it will help you to keep in time.








Shoe the Donkey



There is a special two-hand dance that goes with the tune.

A blacksmith would shoe a donkey by holding the hoof to be shoed across and in front of the supporting leg (cross the buckle). This is the starting position for this two-hand dance.

Say 'Shoe the Donkey' in your head when you're playing the first four bars and this will help with your timing.










Buachaill Ón Éirne

This is a song about 'The Boy from the River Erne'. It tells the story of a rich boy who could get any nice young girl he wanted because he was rich and owned Co.Cork, two sides of the glen, and Co.Tyrone.

The River Erne is in the northwest of Ireland flowing through lots of Ulster counties. It rises in Beaghy Lough in Co. Cavan and flows 64 miles to the sea at Ballyshannon, Co. Donegal.
